



Key Elements


 Improve the accuracy, completeness, integration, timeliness uniformity, collection, and accessibility of data used in traffic safety analysis;

67%

of all roadway deaths are a result of a roadway departure



A roadway departure is defined as any instance in which a vehicle leaves the travel lane. It includes a non-junction, Head-On collision (HO), Side-Swipe Opposite Direction (SSOD), Fixed-Object (FO) or Roll-Over (RO).

49%

of all roadway deaths involved an unrestrained vehicle occupant



Unrestrained is defined as no or improperly restraint usage. An Unrestrained Vehicle Occupant includes all vehicle occupants regardless of seat position, and age and includes seatbelts, booster seats, and child passenger seats.

66%

of all roadway deaths involve an impaired driver



An impaired driving crash is indicated on the crash form that one of the drivers was impaired by alcohol & / or drugs.


99%

of impaired driver involved deaths occurred in rural crashes.




Rural is defined as any area outside the city limits.

Montana Counties




