Traffic Regulations and Safety Rules

1. Montana does have speed limits! The basic rule requires reasonable and prudent speeds at all times based on prevailing conditions. Expect citations and fines that will appear on your record. The maximum highway speed limit is 65 mph on interstates and 55 mph on all other highways (unless otherwise posted). Limits are also posted through towns and other areas and are enforced. Fines double in construction work zones. The daytime speed limit for trucks (over 8000 GVW) is 65 mph on interstates and 60 mph on all other highways (unless otherwise posted).
2. All vehicle occupants must wear a safety belt, and children under four (or forty pounds) must be restrained by an approved restraint system. 3. Motorcycles must be operated with lights on at all times. Not more than two motorcycles may be operated side by side in a single traffic lane. Operators under 18 and passengers under 18 must wear approved headgear (helmet).
4. An auto or recreational vehicle with manufacturer's rated capacity of less than 2,000 pounds may pull one trailer, and may not exceed 65 feet long. Other combinations may not exceed 75 feet long. Neither combination may exceed 8'6" wide, and 14 feet high. Call 406/444-6130 for more information or permits.
5. Bicyclists are required to obey the motor vehicle traffic laws.

POINTS OF INTEREST

- 1. **LAST CHANCE GULCH (B-6)**. Helena, gold was discovered on July 14, 1864. Third Territorial Capital and present State Capitol Building and Helena State Museum and Library, visitors welcome. Conducted tour of Helena by Last Chance Tour train, Carroll College, MT State Veterans Cemetery and Hospital, State Capitol, St. Helena's Cathedral, House of Representatives, the Low Meador and Vandergriff Parks.
- 2. **BUTTE (B-4)**. Today part of the historic area, World Museum of Mining and 1929 Mining Camp, Benary Park, MT Tech Mineral State University, Museum of the Rockies, Custer National Museum, Gallatin Pioneer Museum, Fish Technology Center, Emmons Cultural Center.
- 3. **HEB OF THE GREAT VALLEYS (D-2)**. Missoula, The University of Montana, 1879 State Capitol, Rocky Mt. Elk Woods, Award Winning Carrousel, Ft. Missoula, two ski areas, Garnett Great Staircase, Veterans Memorial, Historic St. Francis Xavier Church, Pioneer Paintings, International Wildlife Film Festival, International Chivalry Festival.
- 4. **FLATHEAD LAKE AREA (C-2)**. Center of great year around playground, skiing, and water sports. Boating and fishing with water sports, camping, and outdoor recreation unlimited.
- 5. **FORT PECK DAM AND RESERVOIR (C-8)**. Scenic and fishing. Reservoir and trout fishing. Reservoir and trout fishing. Reservoir and trout fishing.
- 6. **GATES OF THE MOUNTAINS (C-8)**. Discovered and named July 19, 1905, by Lewis and Clark. Glacier cliffs rise 1,200 feet above the Missouri River. Abundant with wildlife. Boat tours, fishing and water skiing.
- 7. **GREAT FALLS OF THE MISSOURI RIVER (C-8)**. Discovered in 1805 by Lewis and Clark. Great Springs, waterfalls, and water skiing. Great Falls National Park and Fish Hatchery, five hydroelectric dams, Lewis & Clark National Historic Site, and the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 8. **POMPERY PILLAR (F-6)**. July 25, 1806, Captain William Clark carried the flag of Great Falls to the top of the rock formation. The signature is still there. Registered National Historic Landmark. Tours and interpretive programs.
- 9. **BEARTOOTH COUNTRY (D-7)**. Travel this scenic southwest corner of Montana. The Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 10. **LEWIS AND CLARK CAVERNS (F-6)**. Montana's first and best known park features one of the most beautiful limestone caverns in the northwestern United States. Colorful, crystalline and limestone provide an exciting two hour guided tour.
- 11. **MASON CANYON EASTWIND (A-8)**. July 11, 1937, August 17, 1937, an awesome earthquake and had a minor impact on the canyon, creating a great dam and Glacier Lake. Memorial Veterans Center for the Aged. Third largest natural hot spring in Montana.
- 12. **NATIONAL SCENIC RANGES (D-8)**. Large herds of bison, elk, pronghorn antelope, and sheep and goat, and many other wild birds and mammals. Self-guided tours from the site of the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 13. **RECREATION AREA (D-9)**. A 400-million dollar, long multi-million dollar, multi-purpose water resources project. Furnish 90-mile long Lake Lewis and Clark. Various other projects.
- 14. **MUSEUM OF THE PLAINS INDIAN (B-1)**. An excellent collection of artifacts portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians in the days of the Lewis and Clark expedition.
- 15. **COW CAPITAL OF THE WEST (B-1)**. Range Riders Museum, a memorial to those who rode the unforgiving range. Annual Old Time Cowboy Days. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 16. **ST. IGNATIUS MISSION (D-12)**. Established in 1854 for the Catholic Indians. The greatest church to be seen in the west.
- 17. **MEDICINE ROCKS (F-12)**. A very interesting experience. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 18. **COYOTE CANYON (F-12)**. 220 acres containing numerous wild and rocky shaped sandstone formations, a result of wind erosion. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 19. **PINTEL SCENE ROUTE MT 4 (F-8)**. Anaconda, Georgetown Lake, Philaburg, Drummond, fishing, hunting, skiing, shopping, and more. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 20. **BOWDWIN NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE (B-8)**. Abundant with resident and migratory wildlife. Various other projects.
- 21. **OLD TRAIL MUSEUM (B-4)**. Opened in 1963. Cultural history of the Rocky Mountain Frontier. Hands-on paleontological museum.
- 22. **BIG HOLE NATIONAL MONUMENT (F-6)**. Commemorative site where those who fought and died in a pivotal battle between the US Army and the Northern Plains Indians. See the Lewis and Clark National Historic Site.
- 23. **ALDER GULCH (B-4)**. Rich gold placer diggings were discovered in the spring of 1863. Historic Virginia City became the second Territorial Capital. Rich gold placer diggings and rich gold country.
- 24. **CULBERTSON MUSEUM (B-12)**. Ten rooms with period furniture, displays of clothing, schoolroom, general store, doctor shop, dental office, kitchen, military, mail and ranch and many more.
- 25. **BILLINGS (F-8)**. Moss Mansion, Western Heritage Center, J.K. Blanton Studio and Gallery, Peter Yeager a Yellowstone County Museum, Yellowstone Art Center, Alberta Bar Theater, Billings and many more.
